1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Government College Birohar (Jhajjar) is located in rural vicinity, having lush green lawns, trees and a pollution free environment. The college embarked upon its journey in the year 2007 as Co-educational Institution. During its journey of over 17 years, the college has made tremendous progress on all fronts, be in education, sports, extracurricular besides a variety of other fields. The college has strength of 880 students enrolled in the session 2023-24. The college is situated on Birohar – Khanchroli Road and in the West direction of District Jhajjar and East direction of city Charkhi Dadri. The college has its own occupied campus in the village - Birohar in district - Jhajjar. The college is recently included u/s 2(f) of UGC Act 1956 on dated 18-12-2023. The college has lush green ground, library, well-equipped Science Labs, Computer Labs, ICT classrooms and two spacious multipurpose Halls. The enriching study environment and the participative work culture govern the functioning of the college. The college administration and staff are committed to their work in order to meet the demands of changing educational requirements. The institution emphasises on the all-round development of the students' personality so that they can meet the challenges of life with grit and confidence. The holistic development of students is the prime motto of the institution. Starting with the minimum requirements, the college has progressed by leaps and bounds and has undergone a complete transformation. During the last five years, the college has progressed in many spheres. The Post Graduate Programs are opting CBCS in M.A. History whereas Medical Science in B.Sc has been introduced during the last five years. The physical infrastructure is augmented and maintained from time to time to provide physical facilities to the students. Various cocurricular/extracurricular and extension activities are organized frequently and the students' participation is remarkable. The addition of innovative online learning modules is a forward step in the difficult time of unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic. The staff members are striving hard under the effective leadership of the worthy Principal and following the visionary policy guidelines given by MDU Rohtak & Directorate of Higher Education Haryana.

This government institute offers excellent educational opportunities approved by UGC under Sections 2f .The College boasts of an extensive campus with three teaching floors and one Conference Hall. It is widely acknowledged throughout the state that this college is among the best rural college for higher education.

- Government College, Birohar (Jhajjar) is a college dedicated to the Co-educational Institution of students in a rural area. Specially the girl students of the nearby villages empower themselves in this rural vicinity.
- There is an eco-friendly and well-maintained college campus.
- The institution has a good vision infused with moral values and professional ethics.
- Some teachers of the college are the members of U.G and P.G. Board of Studies in M.D. University Rohtak
- There is well oiled system regarding Feedback Mechanism from various stakeholders.
- The Faculty of the Institution is well-qualified, proficient in teaching and engaged in research work.

- NSS Units, Women Cell, YRCA, Cultural Society, Legal Literacy Cell and Subject Societies are striving to ensure the all-round development of the personality of the students.
- Adequate infrastructure is available for teaching learning process. Semi-equipped and ICT-enabled conference hall is available for organisation of various events.
- One semi-automated and semi air-conditioned library with e-resources is available.
- Wireless internet is available in the form of Wi-Fi in the limited area of the college.
- Students' performance in sports is excellent. Athletic Meet is an annual affair of the institution.
- All the teachers are enthusiastic committed to the welfare of the students.
- Participation of students in extra-curricular activities is appreciable.
- Developing students' abilities, promoting tolerance, providing appropriate training and activities and facilitating significant placements and career advancement all are given priority.
- We lay emphasis on promoting gender equality, environmental sustainability, economic growth and social justice through extension programmes that focus on positive objectives.

Institutional Weakness

The colege is incessantly struggling in some areas where need to pay more attention for the better solution of the hereunder mentioned weekness on priorities bases:

- Because the majority of the college's academic curriculum is designed for graduate students, the college's teaching faculty does not perform enough research work or publish enough in high-impact journals.
- As a government institution affiliated with a state university, the institute's approval and addition of new courses to its multidisciplinary, cutting-edge curriculum are restricted.
- The college provides limited certificates and value-added courses to the students.
- Shortage of teaching, non-teaching and supporting staff opportunities.
- No labs of Botany & Zoology subjects which are newly introduced in the college.
- Inadequate IT Computer System facility.
- The college provides a relatively limited number of opportunities for students to participate in training to make it to competitive exams.
- The college's information technology (IT) infrastructure does not adequately support the number of students enrolled in the college.
- Inadequate transport facility for the students specially girls.
- Fire safety measured to be introduced in the college building.
- Inadequate supply of electricity in the institution.
- Facing the problem of Regular & Permanent Head of Institution.

Institutional Opportunity

The colege has trementous and bazillion opportunities to perform in a better way and to emerge a iconic institution not noly at state level but at national level also:

- The COVID-19 pandemic has made it possible for colleges to switch from traditional ways of teaching to more modern ones and teachers are using newer platforms like Google Meet, Google Classroom, WhatsApp Groups, Webex, YouTube and Zoom, etc.
- Opportunities have increased for students to continuously and regularly participate in community

outreach programs in the college. The students' possibilities for employment in non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and corporate sectors have increased as a result of the operation of the placement cell.

- The College has been designated as the Evaluation Center for Maharishi Dayanand University, Rohtak for the sessions 2020-21 & 2023-24. It is a challenging opportunity for the institution to perform as per the expectation and SOP of the university and act accordingly.
- Alumni Association needs to be more functional and strengthen for better outcome in the future to provide the students with opportunities to learn from the alumni of the college.
- Multipurpose Hall to be furnished properly with state of art technology.
- Honours in the subjects of History, Mathematics, Chemistry and Geograpy may be introduced.
- PG in the subjects of Geography, Hindi, English, Political Science and Sociology may be introduced in the college.
- Library may be fully transformed into Information Centre.
- More Placement opportunities will be created and provided by organising Job Fairs and Mega Conclaves with the collaboration of reputed cmpanies and organisations.
- More Value Added and Certificate Courses will be introduced in the institution.

Institutional Challenge

The institution is consecutilely facing the hereunder cited challenges:

- This institution adheres to the course requirements set by Maharishi Dayanand University Rohtak. Value-added courses and programmes that are relevant to the needs of today's students are necessary to meet their demands.
- All Departments of the college require interdisciplinary research and it must be of a high standard.
- The progression of students in higher education is a challenge due to familial and financial circumstances of the rural students.
- The complete data of the progression of the pass out students is extremely difficult to compile as all the alumni are not in touch with the college.
- Communication skills, particularly in English, are a challenge due to the rural background of students and lack of proper awareness.
- Collaboration with external agencies is a challenge.
- The deputation of the staff in administrative and non-academic activities like pandemic duties, making of voter IDs, driving licences, and passports, etc. is a hurdle and it hampers the teaching-learning routine and environment.
- The chances of campus placements are few as the college does not have direct contact with the MNCs for substantial MoUs.
- Regular & Permanent Head of Institution/ Principal for the smooth functioning and guidance of the institution.
- Absence of Librarian in the college for proper managing of it.
- To increases the falling enrollment of students in the college year by year.
- To motivate the boy students for participation in various college activities regularly and actively.
- To increase and improve the College & University Pass percentage.
- To maintain the conjovial and conducive environment in the college campus.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Government College Birohar, Jhajjar imparts education in Arts, Commerce and Science streams at the Under Graduate Level and History at the Post Graduate Level. The curriculum of these classes in various subjects is designed and decided by Maharishi Dayanand University, Rohtak comprising by a panel of subject experts and the Members of the Board of Studies following the guidelines of the University Grants Commission. The syllabi framed are divided into two parts, viz. Theory and Practical, so that the students may use their learning in practical situations. It helps the students to develop scientific attitude.

The college follows the academic calendar provided by the university and all the faculty members prepare their monthly lesson plans to complete the syllabi well in time. Two assignments per subject need to be submitted by every student in each of the semesters. Internal assessment is prepared according to the university norms and is uploaded digitally on the portal of the university. Practical examinations are conducted according to the examination schedule provided by the university. Evaluations of practical as well as theory examinations are conducted in time. Various activities like Sports Meets, Cultural Programs, NSS Programs, YRC, Placement Cell Activities which are associated with Academic Aalendar are organized as per the university guidelines.

Faculty members use the reference books and provide notes to the students. The teachers organize quizzes so that students can be motivated to prepare for competitive exams. Group discussions, questionnaires, classroom seminars and extension lecturers are also organized for better understanding of the topics and to overcome the hesitation. To make teaching more effective, the teachers use the ICT assisted methods like online lectures through Google Classroom, Google Meet, Zoom, PPT, YouTube Lectures and many more online platforms. CBCS has been implemented in Post Graduation Course since 2016. Along with curricular instructions, students are involved in extra-curricular activities like Declamation, Debates, Quiz Contests, Newspaper Reading Contests, Seminars, Essay Writing Competitions, Group Songs, Group Dances, and Act Play etc. Feedback has been taken from all stakeholders and consequent action taken is prepared after carefully analyzing the feedback.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College has maintained an average Student Enrollment Rate of 65.95% in the last five years i.e. 2019-20 to 2023-24. The highest number of admissions enrolled during the 2021-22 academic year, with 466 students registered against 640 sanctioned seats for the first year. In the session of 2023-24, the college witnessed a total enrollment of 880 students across various undergraduate and postgraduate courses. For first-year admissions, 55.26% of seats were filled by students from reserved categories (SC, ST, OBC, etc.) in accordance with the applicable Reservation Policy. Specifically, 308 seats were allocated for these categories in the academic session of 2023-24, following the Government of India and State Government regulations.

Regarding faculty, the college has consistently maintained 95.52% of full-time teachers relative to the sanctioned posts over the past five years. Impressively, 100% of these full-time teachers hold qualifications such as NET, SET, SLET, and Ph.D. In the session of 2023-24, there were 24 full-time teachers out of 32 sanctioned posts. The institution prides itself on maintaining transparency in its internal and external assessment processes. Student evaluation is conducted through a variety of methods, including class tests, monthly exams, unit tests, presentations, and assignments, culminating in the University Semester Examinations.

G.C. Birohar emphasizes a student-centric approach to learning, blending academic and co-curricular activities. Students are encouraged to engage in a variety of enriching experiences, including visits to other institutes, field and educational trips, and extension lectures by experts. These activities not only enhance their educational journey but also expand their perspectives.

The college offers a structured education programme that includes five courses: four undergraduate and one postgraduate programme. This systematic approach aims to foster a natural inclination towards learning among students. Despite these efforts, the average pass percentage over the last five years has been 21.83%, which is considered not satisfactory. A significant factor contributing to this low pass rate is the rural background of students, coupled with a lack of seriousness towards their studies. The college continues to strive for better outcomes by addressing these challenges and enhancing its support for student learning and development.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Faculty members of the College are actively engaged in research activities. During the last five years, faculty members have published 13 research papers in UGC Care Listed Journals and have also Edited Chapters in the books. In addition of publication, college is also working on patent rights, a special cell is constituted for IPR related programs, one of the college faculty members has registered the design of 'Precision Crop Monitoring Drone's under the provisions of Design Act 2001 and Design Rules Act 2002. Apart from publications, faculty members attend Faculty Development Programs, Refresher Courses/Orientation Courses on Research Methodology and in their relevant streams. Further, the college has been conducting periodic National Level and State Level Seminars for the benefit and promotion of the research atmosphere, encouraging faculty to involve in article presentations/publications and establishing collaboration for research activity.

The College is also actively involved in extension activities to help society through its services. The College ensures the involvement of the community in its activities by organizing mass blood donation movements, rallies, and plantation drives. The college has two units of NSS and one unit of YRC, through which the college renders social and community services. Besides organizing Blood Donation Camps, Environmental Awareness Programs, and Awareness Programs on AIDS, Voting Rights, and Adult Literacy, College has adopted the village- Birohar. NSS Unit-1 volunteers visited villagers during corona period and got updates on their health conditions, provided required help and also distributed homemade masks. In addition of the above mentioned activities, the college is working on on-the-job training, project work, student / faculty exchange and collaborative research too. College recruits at least two ITI interns every year from ITI Matanhail for internship. Placement Cell of the college organizes Placement Fare with ICICI Bank, Charkhi Dadri since 2021-22 and every year students gets selected for the jobs in the same bank. The college has organized seminars in collaboration with other colleges and also participates in the faculty exchange programme ran by Directorate of Higher Education, Haryana.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Govt. College Birohar (Jhajjar) is affiliated with Maharishi Dayanand University, Rohtak, Haryana. Each department of the college is equipped with necessary facilities to ensure seamless operation. The State Government of Haryana provides grants as per the requirement for the complete infrastructure augmentation. The College seeks to serve the rural region by providing a conducive learning environment and promoting students' overall development. There is a semi-furnished Conference/Multipurpose Hall with seating capacity of 350 persons. The Hall is utilized for various Meetings, Conferences, Gathering, Seminar, Cultural and Women

Cell activities and events. For the smooth functioning of college administration, there are spacious rooms are available for Faculty, SC & BC Cell, Placement Cell, Women Cell and both Units of NSS. The Students can spend their spare time in their concerned rooms i.e. the Girls Common Room, Boys Common Room or in the available lawns. The college provides clean drinking water facility. The college campus is under CCTV monitoring and offers ample parking for staff and students. SOUL software is used for the partial automation of a library which is enriched with 4655 books, one magazine, and four newspapers. The college library has separate male and female sitting sections for reading, and each with a seating capacity of around 30 people. Various cultural activities and events, such as Yoga Day, Women's Day, Voter Day, Environment Day, Republic Day and Independence Day etc. are organized and celebrated in the college campus. Co-curricular activities such as dance, theater, debate, poetic recitation, quiz, painting, and rangoli competitions are continuously organizing during the academic year. A number of cultural events, as well as the Annual Athletic Sports Meet and Games are fundamental parts of the institutional's organization and play an pivotal role in students' overall personality development. The college has facilities for games and sports such as a 200-meter running track, a volleyball court, and ball badminton etc. The institution has modernized its IT infrastructure to meet the needs of its students, resulting in an effective and outcome-based teaching-learning experience. The college provides adequate computer facilities to the faculty members. The institution has made continual efforts to upgrade IT infrastructure and facilities as needed.

Student Support and Progression

In Student Support and Progression, the institute is making a lot of effort to enhance the progression of students towards Higher Education in the prospective of holistic development (cultural, sports, IT skills, etc) and employment. Our college makes sure that the students also get benefitted from various scholarship schemes of the State Government and Centre Government. More than 1218 students of our college have got benefitted from various scholarship of Government Schemes. A large number of students have participated in capability enhancement schemes such as Soft Skills & Life Skills, Placement Cell, etc. There is an Internal Complaint Committee comprising an Anti-Ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, and Sexual Harassment Redressal Cell. We strictly monitor the timely resolution of complaints related to these issues. The Placement Cell facilitates the students for professional growth and success in many leading private sectors & companies. In the past five years, a total of 53 students have progressed to higher education and 29 students got placed in different government and private departments. Twenty nine (29) students have cracked National Level exams like the JRF/NET, SLET and other exams in the previous five years. The institution has various co-curricular, cultural and sports activities to ensure the holistic development of the students. The Institution also encourages the students to participate in cultural activities at the university level under yhe aegis of 'Youth Festivals and there is remarkable performance during the last 5 years. Students actively participate in extension activities through, NSS, YRCA, Women Cell etc. The Institution also facilitates students' representation and engagement in various administrative and co-curricular activities such as Earn While You Learn and Mentor Mentee etc. The Alumni Association was successfully constituted and registered vide Regn. No.: HR/015/2020/00102, dated 08/09/2020 and our alumnae strengthen the institution by contributing in the non-financial mode for student support and progression. The institute holds the alumnae association meeting bi-annually to interact with them and to discuss and decide the future plans and prospective.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution has a well-defined vision and mission. The vision of the college is to impart quality education, fuel students' ambition to develop a "Lifelong learning" attitude, and instill moral values in its disciples. The

success of an institution depends upon the leadership and governance of the college combined with the efforts of all to achieve the vision of the institute. The Principal oversees all the administrative and academic functions by delegating authority to the Council Members, Bursar, Committee Conveners and Heads. Various committees are constituted in which responsibilities are assigned to the members and conveners to ensure a decentralized method of functioning, reflective of effective governance. For strategic development and deployment of its policies, the college makes prospective plans.

The hologram of the college website elucidates the administrative set-up of the college. Various effective welfare measures implemented by our college include Casual Leave, Earned Leave, Duty Leave, Maternity Leave, CCL, Children Allowance, Medical Reimbursement, Annual Increments, Wi-Fi facility and Sports facilities. The process of faculty appraisal is scheduled for the end of the academic year. Teachers need to fill online ACR annually and mandatorily achieve a minimum API Score in order to be promoted of qualify scale. While planning the strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds, strict adherence to protocols is maintained by disbursing the funds under predetermined heads for systematic periodical audits.

For the robust and transparent functioning in college, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is well established. The meetings of IQAC are regularly organized to make future development plans. In its pursuit of excellence, it reviews the teaching learning process, structure and methodologies of working, student results at periodic intervals through various committees like academic committee, internal assessment committee etc.

All the quality assurance measure across academic planning and administrative area governed implemented and supervise the IQAC. Institution academic calendar, curricular activities, suggestions and feedbacks are available at institution website. Seminar, workshop, faculty enrichment programmes and training for faculty and for students as well as. IQAC also ensures the coordination in academic, administrative, financial and other activities in the institution.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The National Education Policy aims to provide highquality education to develop human resources in our nation as global citizens and it has been taken up well by our college. Our college is ready to set up add-on courses/soft skills programmes keeping in view the growing demand for the skilled workforce in both public and private sectors. Our college is mapping out the skill development resource requirements, such as trainers, infrastructure, courses, and associated paperwork. These additional skill courses will help the students to start their entrepreneurship after leaving college. Our college is ready to adopt the vision of NEP and will follow the curriculum of the parent university in letter and spirit. 4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge With the implementation of NEP 2020, there's an system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using emphasis on bolstering India's cultural legacies and online course): ancient wisdom. Presently, the college ensures appropriate integration of the Indian knowledge system by offering Indian Languages and core courses as per the university scheme set up by the

Govt College Birohar (Jhajjar) is an educational institution run by the Government of Haryana. It is affiliated with Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak and it implements the curriculum and the academic calendar that has been developed and enacted by the university.

- At the beginning of the every session, an orientation program is organized for fresh students. A centralized timetable is prepared and distributed to each department. The heads of all the departments meet with faculty to prepare class-wise and teacher-wise timetable.
- The principal and department head monitor and ensure curriculum implementation within the stipulated time.
- Every teacher has student's attendance register and the record of student's attendance is maintained in the same. All college students attend mentor-mentee meetings throughout the year and teachers keep a record of the same.

The institution has launched a variety of initiatives, including the following to ensure that its operations are carried out efficiently and that the curriculum is delivered effectively.

- Lectures include PowerPoint presentations and references to online resources like YouTube etc. Field work and socio-economic surveys are conducted in Geography.
- Postgraduate students are exposed to research activities such as seminars, workshops, extension lectures by subject professionals and experts.
- The curriculum is also enriched by providing content that goes beyond the core topic-contents for knowledge and conceptual clarity of the subject.
- Theoretical knowledge is implemented through fieldwork and practical/experimental activities.

Govt. College Birohar (Jhajjar) follows Maharshi Dayanand University's Calendar.

- The Academic Calendar includes the beginning and closing dates of each semester as well as admissions and exam dates. To ensure smooth and successful operation within this broad framework, each Department frames its timetable before the beginning of the session.
- The Academic Calendar is shared with students and placed on notice boards. Students are notified of all policies controlling pass percentages, promotions, and returns for improvement, letter grades, and grade points via notice boards and in classes.
- Internal Assessment (20 marks) includes 10 for test, 5 for assignment /projects and 5 attendance. The teacher is supposed to coordinate with students and inform students about course projects, and assignments.

- Faculty evaluates students utilizing cutting-edge pedagogies and approaches such as in-class debates and discussions, case studies, field visits and project work. Academic events include extension lectures, seminars, workshops and college level science exhibition.
- Some faculty members of our institution are Members of the Board of Studies in M.D.U. Rohtak. They contribute towards planning and revision of curriculum in accordance with NEP-20 and growing requirements of students at the global level.

The College continually takes positive steps to improve the teaching-learning environment by providing suitable academic infrastructure. The College provides appropriate facilities for both theoretical and practical studies. The College has a well-maintained campus built around 13.5175 acres of tranquil greenery. The details of amenities are presented as follows:

Classroom: The college features 16 well-furnished, ventilated, and spacious classrooms for theoretical sessions to meet existing students' demands.

Laboratories: Chemistry, Physics and Geography departments have operational laboratories with all essential equiptments and facilities. The two working computer laboraties are also available in the college for the students. All laboratories are well-equipped and maintained to encorporate the curriculum-based practical sessions. All laboratories are built in accordance with UGC/Affiliating University and Haryana Government rules and regulations. As per workload guidelines of Haryana Higher Education Department, one practical group consists of 15 students for first, second, and third year practical sessions.

Sports facility: The college has a playground of adequate area of 120*60 sq. meter for outdoor sports .The college has facilities for various outdoor sports like football, volleyball, ball badminton, 200 meter running track etc.

Auditorium/ Multipurpose hall: The college has a fully air conditioned auditorium with acoustics system accommodating approx. 350 students seating capacities with built in sound and visual systems.

Library: College has well equipped central library with reference and text books, magazines, newspapers etc. The college library provides Book Bank facility where students can borrow the books.

Faculty rooms: The College has 10 faculty rooms for various departments like Political Science, Geography, Chemistry, Social Science, Hindi, History, Physics, mathematics etc.

Seminars Hall: College has one seminars hall with approx. 300 to 350 seating capacity.

SC/BC Cell: The College has one SC/BC Cell room.

NSS Room: The College has one NSS room.

Women cell room: The College has one Women Cell room.

Currently the college has 100 Mbps BSNL internet connection via leased line across the campus, as well as Wi-Fi on the ground floor. The college makes continual efforts to upgrade IT infrastructure and facilities as needed. As a part of the Bharat Net Project initiative, BSNL provides Wi-Fi coverage in rural colleges. The biometric attendance system is also active for college employees. The college campus is monitored via various surveillance cameras. The college and the affiliating institution have made significant efforts addressing the utilization of advanced IT tools for the various academic activities such as online class during the Covid-19 epidemic, online admission procedure, Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) in scholarship schemes, online submission of examination forms, internal assessment awards and feedback system. 6.1.1

Response:

The leadership and governance of the college are well reflected in its vision and mission. The vision of the college is to impart quality education, fuel students' ambition to develop a "Lifelong learning" attitude and instil moral values. Being a State Government College, it does not enjoy the authority to govern its system, structure, and policy formulation, but it has operative freedom to accomplish its mission and goals. Depending upon the availability of the resources, the governance and leadership of the college strive towards quality enhancement and sustenance making it a modal institute that "makes a difference". The Success of an institution is the result of the combined efforts to achieve the vision of the institute. Hence the practice of decentralization and participative management.

Decentralization and Participation The college practices decentralization and participative management and is governed in the most democratic and participatory manner, with the active involvement of all the stakeholders in its administration. Being a government institution the major decisions are taken according to DGHE, Panchkula, Haryana. The Principal oversees all the administrative and academic functions, following the University Statutes and DGHE instructions. The Principal delegates authority to the Council members, Bursar, Committee Conveners and Heads, who, then, share it with different levels of functionaries in the departments. Various committees are constituted in which responsibilities are assigned to the members & conveners to ensure a decentralized method of functioning, reflective of effective governance. More than 50 Committees are constituted at the beginning of every academic session and student participation is also ensured for the smooth functioning of the college. The Admission Process in the college is one such system that demonstrates successful leadership, decentralization and participation from the teaching, non-teaching staff and the students. To facilitate a smooth admission procedure, senior faculty members of Humanities, Sciences and Commerce are nominated by the college administration to convene the respective Admissions Committees thus ensuring compliance with the University guidelines. The DGHE office receives the applications through a centralized online admission process and determines the cut-off percentage for the Colleges of the state. During the admissions process, the members of the Admissions Committee verify the candidate's eligibility by authenticating the certificates and documents. After which the application is submitted to the Principal for final signature. The non-teaching staff is responsible for fee collection and allotment of the roll numbers. The data of the admitted students are forwarded to MDU, Rohtak, for registration. NSS volunteers offer guidance to prospective students and their parents during the admission process.

The main authority of the college is the Principal. He takes all the important decisions for the overall development of the college, but all the members of the staff are also equally important to play significant role in the decision making system of the college. In the college council and IQAC, senior members participate to work for the benefits of the college along with the Head of various department of the college. Different associations and cells are there such as cultural society, science, commerce society, women cell, placement cell etc. In all these cells teachers are in charges or nodal officers who participate and take decisions during various meetings and conduct various activities as per the guidelines. Bursar he is also an important member in decision making body related to all financial management. The college has structured decentralized structure for decision making. There are 70 committees in which all the faculty members have their equal participation. In college various committees are constituted by the principal at the beginning of the new session.

- The teachers are free to attend/ organize various seminars or workshops.
- According to the UGC norms and guidelines, teachers must keep a yearly record of their academic endeavors, research publications, and other institutional activities for performance review.
- To be eligible for promotion under CAS, a teacher must submit an annual self-evaluation report in the Annual Performance Assessment Report (APAR) Proforma before the end of the academic session, with all supporting documents to the evaluation and selection committee.
- The teachers also attend short term, add-on courses on methodology, professional courses, etc.
- 180 day's maternity leaves for female employee.
- 15 days paternity leave for first two child to male employee
- Child Care Leave to Women Employees: It is granted for a period of maximum 2 years/730 days.
- Ten days of earned leave per year
- 10 days of casual leave per year is permissible for male employees and 20 for female employees.
- Health center, pension, gratuity,
- Leave Travel Concession/Home Travel Concession as per Haryana Government rules.
- Loan for purchase of Scooter/Car/Computer is granted as per Government fixed interest rate.
- Academic /Duty leave is granted to teacher for conducting examinations, attended Conference/Seminar/Symposia and official meetings.
- Conveyance charges incurred for official work are reimbursed as per entitlement.
- Children education allowance is also provided as per the rules of Haryana government
- Study Leave for pursuing higher education is granted to Teachers with salary excluding conveyance allowance.
- Medical Reimbursement: The bills are reimbursed as per as Per Package rates fixed by Health Department Haryana and PGI Rohtak rates.

Appraisal for the non-teaching staff:

- The non-teaching employees form the much-needed support system that functions as the lynchpin of the college.
- Employees who work in administration, in the laboratory and library, as well as in the class IV category, are all designated support staff members.
- HODs evaluate the performance of the laboratory staff using confidential self-evaluation forms.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Strategies for Mobilization and Optimal Utilization of Resources and Funds

The college receives funding from Haryana Government and rusa.

The conveners of the various committees and teachers in-charge submit their requirements. It is expected that they will ensure that the labs, library, computing facilities, classrooms, and other equipment and facilities are continuously maintained and enhanced while the requirement is being submitted.

Following the requirements, an estimated proposal budget is prepared according to the general financial norms established by the government of Haryana and sent to the Competent Authority for approval.

All financial paperwork and bills are processed by the Principal and the Bursar.

Internal Audit:

The college has a nominated Financial Officer 'Bursar' who checks and substantiates all the vouchers of the transaction with reference to the approved budget and availability of college funds. He advises the Principal on maintaining financial records and safeguards the integrity of financial accounts. Regular monitoring by the internal financial officer-cum-auditor, Bursar, is very effective in ensuring that all financial transactions are approved following government rules.

Cash-Books and Stock registers are maintained for different fund separately. The expenditure bills of all Govt. Grants is submitted to treasury. Bursar has the internal and external audits' documents for the verification.

The established Purchase Committee and Infrastructure Committee handle all purchasing. Government e-Marketing (GeM) is used to expedite, improve transparency and reduce the cost of purchase of items.

External Audit:

External Audit is conducted every 2-3 years as per government norms. Periodically, the Accountant General of Haryana's audit team examines the state government's financial records. The audit report is released by the Chief Accounts Officer of Haryana when the audit is completed.

There are two types of financial resources: First is government grants received from the Department of Higher Education, Haryana, and second is funds and fees received from students.

Financial Audit includes Funding towards Placement Cell, Women Cell, Earn While You Learn, Lab upgradation, office expenses (O/E), conferences, seminars and workshops are audited and thereafter utilization certificate is also submitted.

The college collects fees from the students under various Heads like Amalgamated Fund, University Fund, Red Cross fund, Radha Krishnan Fund, Abdul Kalam Fund, Sports Fund, Development Fund, Library Fee, electricity charges, NSS etc. The audit of the student's funds is done by the Local Audit Haryana.

The expenditure bills of all the Govt. Grants are submitted to the treasury and the amount is transferred through RTGS/NEFT to the vendor's bank account.

Best Practice 2nd: Masters' Degree in History

Objective:

- Providing advanced knowledge and specialized skills to deepen students' expertise in History field.
- Giving students better qualifications to find good jobs and advance in their careers.
- Motivating more students from rural areas to continue their studies and raise the overall education level in the region.

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• Helping students feel more confident and independent by achieving a higher level of education.

Context:

A unique feature that sets Government college Birohar apart from other nearby colleges is the availability of a Master's degree in the History Department. Due to Colleges in urban location, students have to travel far for higher education, and transportation facilities from the village to the city colleges are very limited. The lack of transportation is a significant barrier to higher education for girls. Government College Birohar which is situated in rural area offers a Master's in History course with forty seats.

Practice:

College has a highly qualified faculty to teach students. M.A. in History course has become a boon for the girls in the surrounding rural areas who cannot go to cities for higher education. There is a high level of competition among students for admission in the Master's in History, with most of the seats being taken by girls. Other than this, college started a program named Partibha Samman Samaroh for meritorious students of the college. Under this program, institute honors the students with Rs.1100 who have passed UGC NET and Rs. 2100 for the students who crack JRF. This scheme even includes those students who have been passed out from the college.

Success of Evidence:

The History Department boasts a team of highly qualified teachers who work with dedication to enhance their students' education. This dedication is evident in the results of the M.A. History class. Many students have passed the UGC exams, bringing recognition not only to the History Department but to the entire college. Rajni Shehrawat, a student of the History department, passed the NET in June 2020 and the JRF in June 2023, adding to the college's prestige. Kumari Monika has passed the NET in December 2020 and the JRF in December 2022. Ashish has passed the NET exam in History in June 2022, and Manjit did the same in December 2022. These achievements reflect the hard work and commitment of both the students and the faculty, elevating the reputation of the History Department and the college.

Problems encountered and resources required:

- To break stereotype mentality of people belonging to the rural area.
- Promoting girls' education in this region was a big challenge for college.
- Inadequate facility of transport was also a challenge for female students who were willing to take admission in higher education.
- Shortage of teaching staff in History Department.
